SHIRE OF ESPERANCE

Esperance is a vibrant regional town situated on the stunning south coast of Western Australia, approximately 700km from Perth, accessible via a 90-minute flight or 7.5-hour drive.

Enjoying a Mediterranean climate and home to 14,000 people the region offer's a much sought-after safe and relaxed lifestyle for those who live and work here.

Home to the deepest port in the southern hemisphere and connected via road and rail with a regional airport, the town is a critical service hub for the wider Goldfields - Esperance region. The region has a well-established and innovative agricultural sector, a developing tourism destination and expanding small and medium business sector.

The region is known for its world class coastline and the picturesque Recherche Archipelago with some 100 uninhabited islands, and iconic pristine white beaches which help to attract over 199,000 visitors annually.

The past decade has seen significant public and private investment in developing critical enabling infrastructure and community amenity including the Port Access Corridor, Esperance Residential College, Esperance Waterfront, Esperance Tanker

Jetty, Esperance Sports Stadium and the Hospital Redevelopment.

The next decade is about continuing to build on this strong foundation and continuing to deliver high class urban realm, attractive public spaces and excellent community amenities whilst expanding our economic opportunities.



The Esperance Region possesses a number of competitive strengths which can be further leveraged for economic development. These include:



Productive and Innovative Agricultural Industry

The Esperance Region boasts vast, fertile land ideal for diverse primary production enterprises, supported by a forward-thinking farming community.



Established and Expanding Export Supply Chain Infrastructure

Robust industry-standard road and rail links to Esperance Port, with strong connections to WA's mining and agriculture sectors. Significant potential for infrastructure expansion.



Frequent Flights

Multiple daily flights to and from Perth, ensuring seamless connectivity.



Extensive and Pristine Natural Assets

Home to stunning beaches, national parks, and the Recherche Archipelago, positioning the region as a premier tourist destination.



Largely Self-Sufficient Economy

The region's isolation from major Australian population centres fosters a self-sufficient

economy, offering compelling incentives for new ventures due to the high cost and complexity of servicing from larger centres.



Outdoor Lifestyle

The safe, relaxed rural and beach lifestyle, coupled with excellent social infrastructure, makes the Esperance Region an attractive and desirable place to live and conduct business.



Southern Ocean

The Southern Ocean provides the Esperance Region with significant economic opportunity through commercial fishing, aquaculture, tourism and recreational fishing.



Mining Deposits

Esperance is within close proximity and has vital transport routes connecting to significant, world class mining activities in the Goldfields, as well as known and potential deposits of resources within the Esperance-Ravensthorpe region.

These competitive advantages position the Esperance Region as a prime location for living, visiting and investing, providing a robust foundation for future economic development.



EXTERNAL DRIVERS AND TRENDS

Megatrends are significant transformative processes with global reach, broad scope and dramatic impact shaping the world in the 21st Century. Some drivers and trends will present

opportunities whilst others will have a direct negative impact. Identifying these trends early and understanding their impacts is important so regional businesses and communities can prepare and operate today and into the future.

The following drivers and trends have been outlined as they present key challenges and opportunities to the Shires economy.



HOUSING SUPPLY

Nationally there are currently significant challenges in delivering housing in urban and regional areas.

Access to affordable and diverse housing is crucial to the development of diverse, vibrant and sustainable communities. It allows people to establish roots within the community and contribute to the economic development of their communities by providing a workforce for business and industry and delivery of essential community and support services.

Regional housing markets are however influenced by a range of factors such as population and economic trends, the cost and availability of labour and capital, policy controls, investment returns and others. As such issues of affordability and the supply of quality housing in the required locations can inhibit the economic and social development of the regions.

These challenges are currently heightened in Esperance and this is leading to a number of

economic and social challenges, with significant knock on impacts. Severe housing shortages are occurring which has the potential for long-term adverse impacts in decades to come.

A range of housing interventions and actions as outlined in the Esperance Land, Housing and Accommodation study are required to improve the future housing supply in Esperance and will require the full support of all levels of government, business and the community.



TECHNOLOGY CHANGES

Technology Changes are transforming many aspects of business operations and consumer behaviour. This shift driven by increased mobility, competition and new business models will continue to be a major factor influencing business level success and regional prosperity. Potential

opportunities and challenges for Esperance include;

- Increased opportunity for local businesses to expand through online business models
- Potential for greater access to services (health care, professional, financial) through online delivery.
- Increased competition from businesses servicing the region remotely.
- The need for adequate infrastructure, training and innovative processes to keep the workforce and business a pace with technological advancement.



IMPACT OF CLIMATE CHANGE

Climate change is an urgent and complex global issue that creates both challenges and opportunities for the Shire of Esperance. The Esperance community and environment are at risk from increases in climate volatility associated with climate changes.

Key risks to Esperance include:

 Increased risk of reduced rainfall effecting our major industry agricultural and support businesses.

- Increased frequency of extreme temperatures and emergency service responses.
- Increased risk of coastal erosion and inundation.

All levels of government along with business and the community have a role to play in responding to the challenge. The Shire's economy will also need to respond to changes in State, national and global responses to climate change and the impacts this has on energy and trade.

The State government aspiration of net zero emissions by 2050 will require a transformation of energy generation and use, the promotion of new clean low emissions industries, increased resilience in regional communications and the promotion of lower carbon transport

Esperance must therefore be flexible and ready to respond to changes in global economic and regulatory settings in response to climate change.



AGEING POPULATION

Australia's population is ageing, primarily as a result of increased life expectancy. The population aged 75 or more years is expected to rise by 4 million from 2012 to 2060, increasing from about 6.4% to 14.4% of the total population (Productivity Commission, 2013).

The ageing population will mean significant additional spending on health and aged care, while creating significant market niches servicing an older demographic.

Implications for Esperance include:

- Additional need and market for aged and health care and reskilling older workers.
- Older persons to represent a growing proportion of the demographic and labour force.
- Increasing propensity for consumption of health care and associated allied services.



WHAT IS ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT?

"Economic Development" is a phrase that characterises any activity, initiative, investment or policy that seeks to improve the economic and social wellbeing of people. This recognises that we all live in a community, not an economy, and that economic activity should make people's lives better.

Successful economic development activities seek to grow and enhance the capacity of a local economy to

generate wealth and prosperity in the long-term to underpin improvements in the lives of residents. The concept of economic development has evolved over time, shifting from a focus on headline economic growth and employment figures to more nuanced and meaningful objectives such as sustainability, wellbeing, quality of living, resilience, social cohesion and integration.

WHO IS RESPONSIBLE FOR ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT?

Economic development of the Esperance region is a shared responsibility. It represents the collaborative and collective effort of key economic development stakeholders across all three levels of Government, Traditional Owners and other indigenous groups and communities, local and national businesses, major economic asset owners, investors, workers and residents. Each organisation and person in

Esperance have an important role to play in realising positive economic development outcomes in the shire.

Every dollar spent, invested and earnt in the shire represents an opportunity to foster economic development and enhance quality of life of our residents.

WHAT IS THE ROLE OF LOCAL GOVERNMENT?

In recent years, local governments have played an increasingly central role in achievement of economic and social development objectives across Australia. Local government has a distinct advantage over

other levels of government in the implementation of economic development initiatives because of its closer connection to both business and households in the community.



SHIRE OF ESPERANCE AS AN ECONOMIC DRIVER AND CATALYST

Whilst the Shire plays an important role in setting the land use frame work for economic and social development it is also a key economic driver and business in its own right, employing over 250 people with average annual expenditure of \$50 million, and an asset value of \$750 million.

In addition to this direct expenditure impact, the Shire of Esperance is responsible for owning maintaining and operating a number of critical services, infrastructure and facilities which support economic activity. Some examples include;

- Maintaining the regional road network (the largest regional road network in the State)
- Waste collection and management, footpaths, bridges and public toilets.
- Operating and maintaining the Esperance Airport.
- Managing and operating the Esperance Visitor Centre.

- Provision of recreation facilities such as parks and sporting fields, Esperance Indoor Sports Stadium and Esperance Bay of Isles Leisure Centre.
- Operating and maintaining camping grounds and facilities.
- Operating and maintaining cultural facilities and services such as the Esperance Library, Esperance Civic Centre, Esperance Museum and Esperance Visitor Centre.
- Operating community services such as Esperance Home Care.

A large proportion of the expenditure and workforce is focused on delivering this essential infrastructure and services which are fundamental to supporting economic activity, business development and attracting and retaining people to Esperance and the region.



SHIRE OF ESPERANCE LED PROJECTS AND KEY ADVOCACY PROJECTS

Esperance is home to significant economic and social opportunities. Council has and will continue to play a central role in the advocacy of projects

attraction of funding, the facilitation of investment, and the implementation and delivery of key major projects across the Shire.

PRIORITY PROJECTS

ESPERANCE KEY WORKER ACCOMMODATION PROJECT

Value: \$10.23 million

Status: Seeking \$7.73 million Funding

The Esperance Key Worker Accommodation Project is designed to help provide a sustainable, long term solution to the ongoing lack of, key worker accommodation in the Shire of Esperance.

The lack of required housing and accommodation availability is contributing to a range of economic and social challenges within the Shire of Esperance. These include:

 Business viability - with many businesses having to reduce operating hours due to lack of housing for staff:

- Workforce attraction and retention with rising rents and lack of housing encouraging critical service workers to leave the region; and
- Social pressures with community and government service needs increasing as access to affordable housing and accommodation is constrained.

The project seeks to develop 20 units on Council free hold land valued at \$1m. The Shire will contribute \$1.5m cash to the project and is seeking \$7.73m from the State or Federal Government to complete the project.



ESPERANCE AIRPORT AIRSTRIP REDEVELOPMENT

Value: \$35-\$40 million

Status: Business Case Development

This project is for the reconstruction and extension of the Esperance Airstrip main runway and associated infrastructure to meet current and future useage. The proposal also includes the upgrade of the gravel cross strip to ensure regulated air passenger services, RFDS, emergency services and other chartered flights can continue whilst the main airstrip is closed for 12months, to complete the upgrade.

Two independent assessments of the airstrip have deemed that the main runway subgrade and

pavement needs to be reconstructed and as part of this work, Council is seeking to also lengthen the airstrip to cater for larger planes to open up the route to other destinations, and allow larger emergency services planes to access the airport.

As a remote location and with over 55,000 RPT passengers, 250 RFDS flights per annum, commercial flights and emergency services planes including water bombers, using the Airport, it's a critical piece of infrastructure for Esperance and the State of Western Australia.

The estimated cost to develop both airstrips is \$35 - \$40m and the Shire is contributing a third of the total costs and seeking Federal and State funding support for the remaining amount.



ESPERANCE SENIOR HIGH SCHOOL REDEVELOPMENT

Value: TBC

Status: Seeking Funding

The redevelopment of the Esperance Senior Highschool is a high priority project for the Shire.

Esperance senior Highschool was built in the 1960's and designed for 400 students. With over 800 students currently enrolled and limited maintenance and upgrades occurring over the past

 $60\,\mbox{years},$ the school is no longer fit for purpose.

The deplorable state of the high school is having a massive impact on students and teachers, plus impacting people's decisions to relocate to Esperance, or move away for better education opportunities.

The Shire is seeking funding for a masterplan, detailed design and capital works program as part of the State budget.



James St Cultural & Tourism Hub

Value: \$30 million

Status: \$22.5 million confirmed, seeking \$7.5M

This proposal is for the development of a new Cultural and Tourism Hub, including new interactive, library and visitor centre and retail and commercial facilities to create a unique visitor experience in the Esperance town centre. The hub is Stage 1 of the redevelopment of the wider James St Cultural Precinct in Esperance.

The development of the James St Cultural and Tourism Hub is the centre piece of activating this area of Esperance town centre and the Waterfront into vibrant cultural spaces and a tourism and commercial hub, bringing the outside indoors and integrating the buildings into the heritage of the hub and within a green parkland setting and culturally appropriate way.

The total cost to deliver the full masterplan is estimated at \$60 million, with Stage 1, estimated at \$30 million. The Shire of Esperance has committed \$7.57 million to the project and received \$14.93 million from the Federal Governments Growing the Regions and Regional Partnerships and Precincts funding programs.

The Shire is seeking the remaining \$7.5 million to complete Stage 1 from the WA State Government.



South Coast Highway Improvements

Value: TBC

Status: Main Roads WA to seek funding for the upgrades

The South Coast Highway is a strategic freight and tourism route in the south east region of Western Australia, servicing the ports of Albany and Esperance and connecting a number of regional towns.

A large proportion (75%) of the South Coast Highway consists of pavement that is more than 40 years old, the oldest in WA. The age, design and condition of the highway is causing significant safety issues, and high operating and maintenance costs.

With population growth and increases in freight volumes and tourism activity, continued decline in road condition will further exacerbate the effects of these problems in the future.

The Shire is seeking Federal and State funding support for the upgrade of the Highway to ensure this critical piece of infrastructure continues to allow our regional communities, visitors and businesses safe and reliable access whilst traversing the region.



Esperance Port Access Corridor – Stage 2

Value: TBC

Status: Main Roads Planning underway

Whilst Stage 1 of the corridor has improved access to the port and surrounding suburbs, serious safety concerns still remain with the interaction of heavy and light vehicles and pedestrians at the Pink Lake road intersection which is the main route to the Esperance Senior High School Nulsen Primary School, Esperance Port and town centre.

Safety concerns and congestion problems also exist at the South Coast Highway and Harbour Road intersection and the Coolgardie - Norseman Road roundabout. These areas are key entry and exit points to Esperance and the interaction of heavy and light vehicles is high, creating serious safety concerns for the community.

The Shire is advocating to both the State and Federal government to fund this critical piece of infrastructure to ensure the town continues to grow in a safe and planned way.



Esperance Waste Transfer Project

Value: \$26 million

Status: Construction underway

- expected to be completed mid 2027

With the required closure of the Wylie Bay Landfill operations, the new Myrup Waste Management Transfer Facility will deliver a fully integrated facility with a range of modern recycling and waste management services to meet the needs of the Esperance community, as well as the wider region.

The Waste Transfer Station will consolidate the mixed/putrescible waste material collected from

the Shire's kerbside collections and commercial operators, and compact it into custom built trailers to be road-trained to a remote Landfill site.

The Materials Recovery Facility will provide a modern, best-practice complex to continue diversion of recyclables from ending up in landfill. One integrated facility will manage the recycling collected from the Shire's kerbside collections, commercial operations and the Community drop-off area. With upgraded, state of the art equipment, safety for staff and recycling efforts will be improved.

Esperance Chamber of Commerce and Industry

Peak industry body representing and advocating for the business sector in Esperance.

Goldfields - Esperance Development Commission

The Goldfields-Esperance Development Commission works across government and industry to capture and deliver positive social and economic initiatives and opportunities.

Australia's Golden Outback

Regional Tourism Association responsible for marketing and promotion of the region. The Shire and AGO have an agreement in place which supports the employment of a Tourism Development Manager in Esperance.

Esperance Tjaltjraak Native Title Aboriginal Corporation

ETNTAC is the first point of contact for government and other parties who want to conduct business with traditional owners in Esperance.

Goldfields - Esperance Regional Development Australia

Regional Development Australia (RDA) is a national network of federally funded committees made up of local leaders who work with all levels of government, business and community groups to support the economic development of their regions.

Goldfields Voluntary Regional Organisational Council (GVROC)

GVROC supports and advocates for the continued investment in regional infrastructure that assists individual community needs and aspirations across the region.



ACTION PLAN OVERVIEW

The Action Plan is closely linked to the Council's Plan, supporting our Prosperity Aspiration: "Growing and thriving Esperance is a great place to live, work, invest and visit."

Key objectives and priority projects from the plan critical to economic development form the basis of the action plan and where Council can directly play a lead role or actively contribute to initiatives and projects that support the region and community. The plan ensures that Council focuses on the priorities which the community identified through the consultation process whilst allowing for projects and initiatives that will be achieved in collaboration with our key partners, business, community and government.

Reflecting the collaborative nature of the Plan, relevant strategic documents have been considered, including:

- Shire Council Plan 2022-2034
- Esperance Tourism Strategy
- Esperance Airport Master Plan
- Esperance Housing and Accommodation Study
- Esperance Events Discussion Paper 2022-2027
- Esperance Town Centre Revitalization Plan 2015

These documents guide the Council's role in assisting and supporting economic development in the region.



MONITORING AND EVALUATION

The Council plan and its projects and initiatives are linked to the performance indicators of officers responsible and are reported monthly and quarterly through the Council's pulse reporting.

The performance is tracked by managers and executive and reported in the annual report.

The Shire also has a community scorecard which it undertakes every two years to measure and

benchmark community perceptions of performance levels. The Prosperity pillar is part of this review and will be used to help guide the role of Council in economic development and future economic initiatives and actions.
